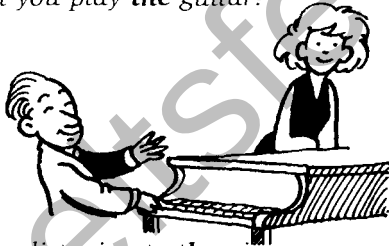

Nouns and adjectives

1 The articles *a* and *the*

- *a* is used:
 - a) with countable nouns to indicate **one**:
*I've got **a** cat.*
 - b) to indicate cost, speed, or frequency:
*fifty pence **a** kilo*
*four times **a** day*
*two hundred kilometres **an** hour*
 - c) for certain numbers:
***a** hundred; **a** thousand; **a** couple; **a** dozen*
- *the* is used:
 - a) when a word is used a second time
 - b) when talking about a known object:
*I've just washed **the** car.* (= our car, or this car)
*Where's **the** dog?* (= our dog, or the dog that is usually here)
*We've made **the** beds.* (= our beds, or the beds here)
 - c) in a general sense, with musical instruments:
*Can you play **the** guitar?*



*I like listening to **the** piano.*

Note: *I've just bought **a** guitar and **a** piano.*

- d) when the object is unique:
***the** moon.*
- Usually, no article is used:
 - a) with abstract nouns (*life, beauty, love, etc.*), languages, and academic subjects (*history, Latin, etc.*):
Life isn't always easy.
Latin is a difficult language to learn.
 - b) with materials (*wine, coal, sugar, etc.*) when they are considered in a general sense:
Glass is a difficult material to cut.
Gold is very expensive at the moment.
Note: There is a difference between:
They were looking for gold. (= any gold)
*They found **the** gold.* (= the gold they were looking for)
 - c) before countries and towns:
They live in Manchester.
 - d) before *school, home, work, church, bed, and hospital* in certain expressions:
We went to church.
She's at home.

2 Words using **a**, **the**, or no article

- Some words are used with **a**, **the**, or no article, depending on the meaning of the word, and whether it is thought of as definite (**the**), indefinite (**a**), or uncountable:

*I put **the** glass on the table.* (definite – a particular glass)

*I picked up **a** glass.* (indefinite – one of a number of glasses)

It's made of glass. (uncountable – glass as material)

- To indicate possession for people or animals:
 - a) add 's to singular nouns, and to plural nouns not ending in s:
 - Monica's dress*
 - the dog's nose*
 - the children's school*
 - b) add ' to plural nouns ending in s:
 - dolphins' brains*
 - the sailors' hats*

- To indicate possession for things:
 - a) use **of**:
the end of the road
the smell of cooking
the leader of the party
 - b) for common nouns (**house, car, school, table**, etc.) **of** is not necessary, and the word position changes:
car keys
the kitchen door
a bus driver
 - c) always use **of** with the words **front, top, bottom, back, end**:
the bottom of the garden (NOT ~~the garden bottom~~)
the front of the house (NOT ~~the house front~~)
 - d) for expressions of time, 's or s' is used:
a fortnight's holiday
two weeks' rest

5 Singular and plural

- To make singular words plural, add **s**.
 - a) If the word ends in **o** or **s**, add **es**:
tomato → *tomatoes*; *glass* → *glasses*.
Note the exceptions: *piano* → *pianos*; *stereo* → *stereos*; *disco* → *discos*; *video* → *videos*.
 - b) If the word is **half**, **leaf**, **thief**, **self**, **shelf**, **wife**, **wolf**, or **knife**, change the **f** or **fe** to **ves**:
half → *halves*; *wolf* → *wolves*.
Note that most other words ending in **f** just add **s**: *roof* → *roofs*.
 - c) Some animals have the same form in singular and plural:
deer → *deer*; *sheep* → *sheep*; *fish* → *fish* (or *fishes*)
Note: the plural of **mouse** is **mice**.

Notes

- If the words ends in **ch**, **sh**, **x** or **s**, add **es**:
match → *matches*; *box* → *boxes*
- If the word ends in **y**, change to **ies**:
baby → *babies*; *lady* → *ladies*
- Remember the common irregular plurals:
men, **women**, **children**, **people**, **teeth**, **feet**

6 Comparatives and superlatives

FORM

	<i>Comparative</i>	<i>Superlative</i>
<i>One-syllable adjectives</i>	older, faster	oldest, fastest
<i>One-syllable adjectives ending in -e</i>	wider, nicer	widest, nicest
<i>One-syllable adjectives ending in one vowel + consonant</i>	hottest, biggest	hotter, bigger
<i>Two-syllable adjectives ending in -y, -er, -ow</i>	happier, funnier, cleverer, narrower	happiest, funniest, cleverest, narrowest
<i>Other adjectives with two or more syllables</i>	more careful, more interesting	most careful, most interesting
<i>Irregular adjectives:</i> good, bad, little	better, worse, less	best worst, least

- Comparatives are used to compare two nouns. They are followed by **than** if the second noun is mentioned:
*Cats are **cleverer than** dogs, but dogs are **friendlier**.*
- Superlatives are used to compare one thing with more than one other thing. They are used with **the**:
*John is **the youngest** child in the class.*

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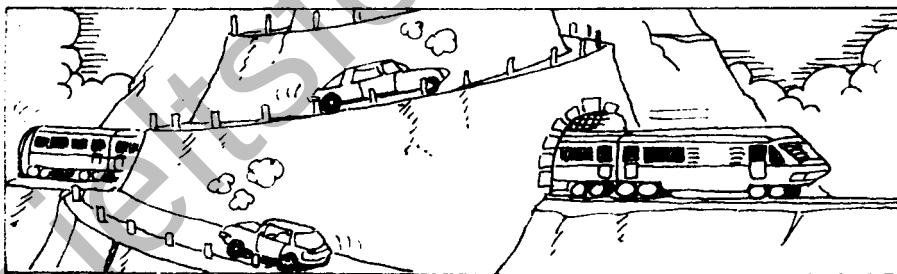

8 **so and such**

So and **such** are used to strengthen the meaning of adjectives and adverbs.

- **such** is used before an adjective that comes before a noun:

*She was **such** a good actress.*

*It's **such** a cold day, isn't it?*

Note: **such** + [a/an] + adjective + noun (singular or plural)

*He shouldn't buy **such** expensive clothes.*

- **so** is used before an adjective alone or an adverb:

*You look **so** lovely!*

*He dresses **so** badly.*

- **so** and **such** are often used with **that**-clauses to talk about the result or consequence of something:

*It's **such** a stupid idea **that** I don't think we should consider it.*

(It's a very stupid idea. For that reason, I don't think we should consider it.)

*I was **so** tired **that** I fell asleep in the lecture.*

(I was very tired. For that reason, I fell asleep in the lecture.)

Present simple

FORM

REMEMBER!

I/You/We/They eat; He/She/It eats.

Do I/You/he/she/it/we/they eat?

I/You/We/They do not (don't) eat.

He/She/It does not (doesn't) eat.

Note the endings with **he**, **she**, and **it**. If the verb ends in **ss**, **sh**, **ch**, or **x**, add **es**:

He washes (wash ends in **sh**)

She catches (catch ends in **ch**)

USE

- for something that is permanently true:
She comes from Argentina.
I don't speak Chinese.
- for habits and repeated actions:
How often do you go to the gym?
He usually leaves work at 6 o'clock.

10 Verbs using Present Simple rather than Present Continuous

USE

- Certain verbs generally use only the simple form, and are not used with the continuous. These are verbs which do not describe activities. They include:
 - a) verbs of thinking and understanding:
*I **believe** you.*
*I don't **understand**.*
*What do you **think**?*
 - b) verbs of seeing, hearing, feeling, etc.:
*I don't **like** him.*
*How do you **feel**?*
*I **want** to go.*
 - These verbs can use the present continuous when they become activity verbs:
*Be quiet, please: I'm **thinking**.* (Here **thinking** is an activity, like **working**.)
*I'm **seeing** the president tomorrow.* (**seeing** = **meeting**)
 - There is a difference between these verbs:
listen – **hear**; **watch** – **see**; **look** – **see**
Listen, **watch** and **look** are deliberate activities, and can use the present continuous:
*I'm **listening** to the radio.*
Hear and **see** are not deliberate activities, and do not usually use the continuous.

11 Present Simple and Present Continuous: permanent and temporary

- The present continuous is sometimes used as a contrast to the present simple, to show temporary events:

*I **live** in Mexico, though I'm **staying** in Texas at the moment.*

*I'm **living** in Paris just now, but I **come** from Belgium.*

I saw a great film last night.
We lived in Sydney for two years.

Past continuous

I/He/She/It was running.
We/You/They were running.
Was I/he/she/it running?
Were we/you/they running?
I/He/She/It was not (wasn't) running.
We/You/They were not (weren't) running.

USE

- To describe a past action at some point between its beginning and its end:
At 8 o'clock last night we were having dinner.
He was walking down the road when he heard a loud noise.

13 Past continuous as narrative

The past continuous is often used in a past simple narrative to describe the background history or environment:

It was a typical summer afternoon: the sun **was beating** down, the cars **were creeping** slowly round the corner of the park. Five or six children **were playing** in the stream by the fountain, jumping in and out of the water, their laughter mixing with the noise of the traffic. All the world **was wearing** shorts and T-shirts, or bathing costumes: yet Walter Harrison, sitting on a park bench in his overcoat, **was feeling** cold and lonely. 'Where will it all end?' he thought, as he watched the children splashing and laughing. After a few minutes, he got up and walked through the park gates. His adventure was about to begin ...

The present perfect is used to show a connection in the speaker's mind between the past and the present. This occurs in two main ways.

a) the unfinished past:

He's been here for 10 minutes. (and he is still here now)
We've lived here since 1996. (and we still live here now)
I've written three letters today.
She's travelled to six countries since she started the job.

b) the indefinite past:

I've broken a glass.
John has lost his job.
I've just heard the news.
Have you finished that report yet?
Have you ever been to China?
She's never flown in a plane.
She's the best teacher I've ever had.

- The present perfect simple is used when the action is complete and the final achievement is important:
I've run six kilometres.
(NOT ~~*I've been running six kilometres.*~~)
- The present perfect continuous is used when the activity is important. We are interested in how someone has been spending time, and the achievement is not important:
I've been running. (NOT ~~*I've run.*~~)

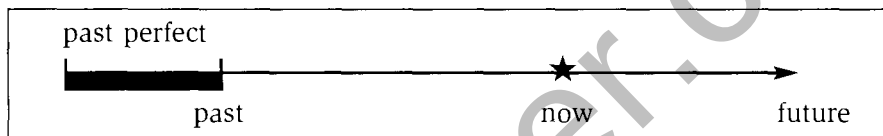

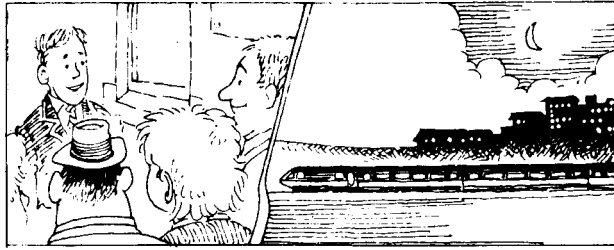

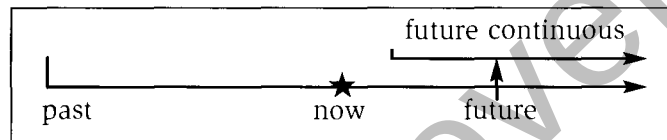

Notes

- going to** or present continuous + time word can frequently be used instead of the future continuous. The main difference between the three is that **going to** and present continuous + time word usually refer to planned or intentional futures:

I'm going to see her tomorrow – we arranged it last week.

I'm seeing her tomorrow, to talk about the new contract.

and the future continuous is less intentional:

I'll be seeing her tomorrow at the weekly sales conference: I'll talk to her about it then.

- Future continuous is sometimes used to refer to the present, when we are guessing about what people are doing:

Peter and Tom will be lying on the beach in Corfu at the moment

I bet they'll be having a good time now that it's hot.

They'll probably be staying at an expensive hotel somewhere.

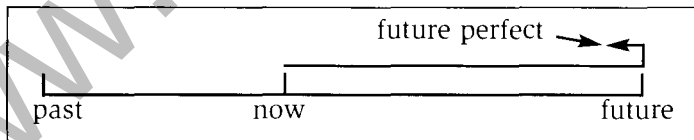

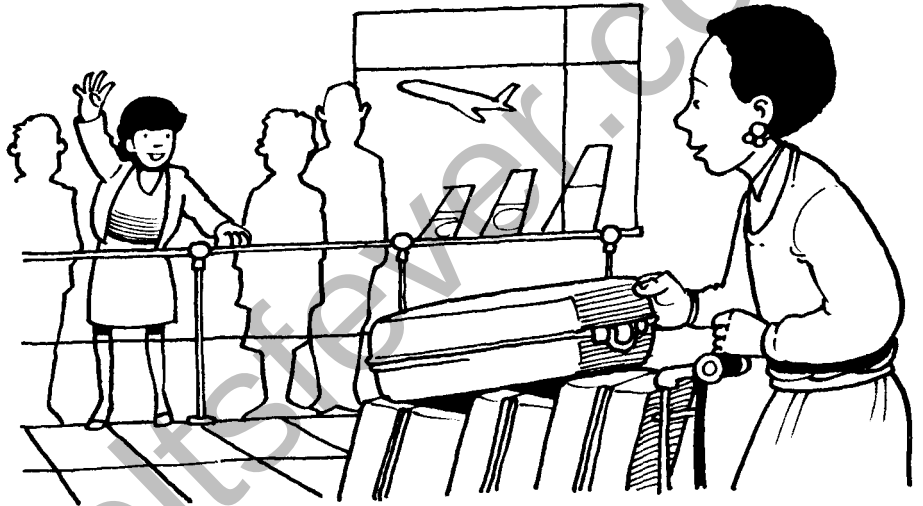

27 Simple and continuous aspects

The **tense** of a verb tells us that it is present, past, or future; the **aspect** gives us other information. There are three aspects – simple, continuous, and perfect. The simple aspect refers to the whole of an activity or event, and not just part of it:

*I'll **have** a bath tonight.* (future simple)

*I **worked** from eight o'clock to ten o'clock.* (past simple)

*I **go** to the office by car.* (present simple)

It is used to describe:

- a general truth:
Big cars use a lot of petrol.
- a complete event or series of events:
We went to Spain for our holiday.
- a repeated, habitual action:
Classes start at nine o'clock.
- feelings, perceptions, etc. – i.e. any verb that is not an 'activity' verb:
I understood the lecture quite well.

The continuous aspect describes an event (or series of events) at some point between its beginning and its end. It is used with activity verbs – e.g. **play, run, walk, go, move, drive**, etc. – and it is the activity which is important, rather than the end result:

They're working at the moment. (present continuous)

I was reading when you phoned. (past continuous)

At this time tomorrow we'll be saying goodbye. (future continuous)

It is used to describe:

- an activity in progress:
I was working in the garden when she called.
- a repeated action which is temporary, and viewed at some time between the beginning and end of the temporary period:
I'm cycling to work this week because my car's in the garage.
- a temporary situation viewed at some point between its beginning and its end:
I'm living in London at the moment.

28 Perfect aspect

The perfect aspect can be either simple or continuous. It tells us:

- that the activity or state being discussed occurs or starts before a certain point in time: and
- that the activity or state has an important connection with that later point in time:

*I **have been** to France twice.* (present perfect: the events occurred before the present time – now)

*It was 1946. The war **had finished** and Jack **had left** the army.* (past perfect: the events occurred before the past time – 1946)

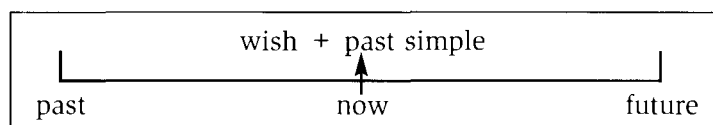

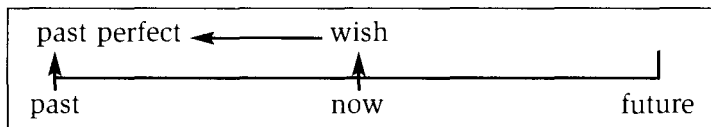

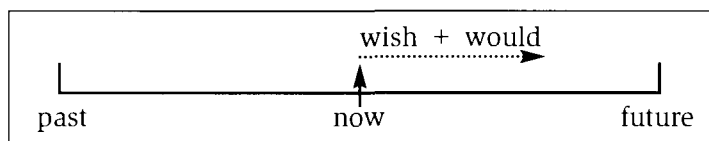

Modals

REMEMBER!

'Modals' are the small verbs like **can**, **must**, and **might**, which give certain meanings to main verbs.

There are twelve modal verbs:

can, could, shall, should, must, ought to, may, might, will, would, need (to), dare

FORM

- Positive is formed by putting the modal between the subject and the main verb.
We should stay.
- Negative is formed by adding **not** (or **n't**) after the modal:
We shouldn't stay.
- Questions are formed by changing the position of the modal and the subject:
Should we stay? Shouldn't we stay?

Notes

- **need** can be **needn't** (modal form) or **don't need to** (verb form).
- Negative questions generally use **n't**. If **not** is used, there is a different word order:
Shouldn't we leave? Should we not leave?

- **have got to** has the same meaning as **have to**:
I've got to go. = I have to go.

- **should** is used more often than **ought to**.

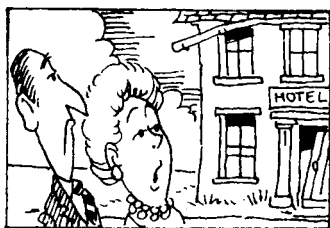

- **should** and **ought to** have their normal meaning in the past.
You shouldn't have done that.
You ought to have warned me about him.
- **may** and **might** have their normal meaning in the past.
John might have told Mrs Jones what happened.
Sheila may have left two or three days ago.
- **could** and **must** in the past are used to indicate deduction. **must have** is more certain than **could have**:
Mike could have stayed in this hotel. (= it is possible that he stayed in this hotel)
Mike must have stayed in this hotel. (= it is almost definite that he stayed in this hotel)
- **can't have** and **couldn't have** indicate a negative deduction. They are used as the negative for **must have**:



Mike *can't have stayed* in this hotel. (= it is almost definite that he didn't stay in this hotel)

- **could have** = it was possible, but I didn't do it:
I could have left at ten o'clock, but I didn't.

Note: In the present, **must be**, **have to be**, **could be** and **can't be** can indicate deduction:
He's late – something must be wrong!

- After a preposition:
Before leaving the house, she checked all the windows.

The infinitive

We can use the infinitive in the following ways.

- After certain verbs:
I hope to be there before dark.
- To express purpose:
I got up early to do my homework.

- after certain adjectives, as a past. This form uses **to**:
I was disappointed to have missed him.

I love to visit old houses.
I love visiting old houses.
I started to polish the car, but then decided not to.
I started polishing the car, but then decided not to.
- **remember**, **stop**, and **try** have a different meaning with the gerund or the infinitive:
 - a) *I remembered to give him the money.*
 (= the remembering happened before the giving)
I remembered giving him the money.
 (= the remembering happened after the giving)
 - b) *I stopped to watch the carnival.*
 (= I stopped because I wanted to watch the carnival)
I stopped watching the carnival.
 (= I had been watching the carnival: then I stopped watching)
 - c) *I tried to open the door, but it was locked.*
 (= I didn't open it)
I tried opening the door to let in some fresh air.
 (= I did open it)

'I must go.' → He said he had to go.

- Tense changes when the main verb is past tense:

Speaker's words	Reported statement
will	→ would
shall	→ should
is going to	→ was going to
present simple	→ past simple
present continuous	→ past continuous
past continuous	→ past perfect continuous
present perfect past simple	→ past perfect
must	→ had to
can	→ could

- that** is optional after the main verb:
He said **that** he wasn't going.
He said he wasn't going.

<i>Speaker's words</i>	<i>Reported statement</i>
tomorrow	→ the next day/the following day
yesterday	→ the day before
here	→ there
this/that	→ the
this morning	→ that morning
today	→ that day
tonight	→ that night
next/on Tuesday	→ the following Tuesday
last Tuesday	→ the previous Tuesday
the day after tomorrow	→ in two days' time
ago	→ before/previously

- Note that these changes generally occur, but they are not automatic. They depend on when and where the statement is reported.
- Some verbs do not change:
would → *would*, *could* → *could*, *might* → *might*
should → *should*, *ought to* → *ought to*

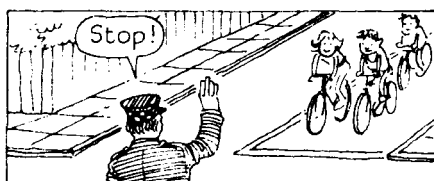

- Reported requests (when you are asking someone to do something for you) have the same grammatical form as reported commands (► Exercise 67):
'Would you open the door, please?'
 → *She asked me to open the door.*
'Could you lend me some money, please?'
 → *He asked me to lend him some money.*
- Reported requests usually use **ask** as the main verb. There is an important difference in meaning between:
*He **told** me to give him some money.* and
*He **asked** me to give him some money.*

Note the difference between a reported offer and a reported request.

a) offer:

'Would you like a cigarette?'

→ *He asked if I would like a cigarette.*

b) request:

'Would you pass me a cigarette?'

→ *He asked me to pass him a cigarette.*

ANNE: Yes, of course.

- An adverb describes **how**, **where** or **when** an action is done:
a) *She hit him **gently**.*
- The adverb can be one word (e.g. **gently**) or a group of words – also called an adverbial phrase:
b) *She hit him **with all her strength**.*
- Both the adverb and the adverbial phrase in these two sentences answer the question *How did she hit him?*
Answer: a) gently. b) with all her strength.
- Adverbs that answer the question **how?** are adverbs of manner.
- Adverbs that answer the question **where?** are adverbs of place.

- Order of adverbs:
 - Adverbs of manner, place and time usually follow the direct object.

 - If there is no direct object, the adverbs usually follow the verb:

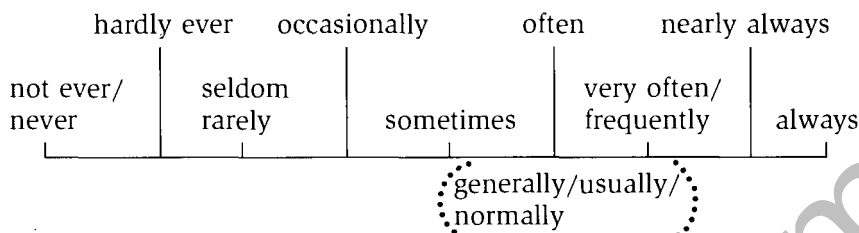

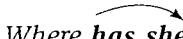

Where's the bank? (normal question)
*Could you tell me **where the bank is**?* (embedded question)
- There are two types of embedded question:
 - a) in reported speech:
*She asked me **where the airport was**.* (► Exercises 64 to 66)
 - b) in polite question forms, when the direct question is thought to be a little rude, and a longer question form is used:
*Could you tell me **what time it is, please**?*
*Do you think **this train is going to be late**?*

FORM

- The position of subject and auxiliary verb in the normal question form is reversed:

*Where **has she** gone?* → *where **she has** gone.*
- A polite question form is now put in front of this new structure.
*Could you tell me **where she has gone**?*

- The most commonly used polite question forms are:

Could you tell me Do you know Do you think you could tell me	if whether where how why	something	happened? has happened? will happen? is going to happen? etc.
---	--------------------------------------	-----------	---

(NOT ~~*Could you tell me where has she gone?*~~)

RELATIVE CLAUSES

Defining relative clauses

REMEMBER!

*The woman who got the job has never worked in advertising before.
The letter that arrived this morning was wrongly addressed.*

- The defining relative clauses tell us which woman we are talking about and which letter we are talking about.
- Defining relative clauses are often indicated by **who** for people and **that** for things.

83 Subject and object defining relative clauses

- The noun which is being described by a clause can be either the subject or object of the relative clause:

The man who normally works here is ill.

Main sentence: *The man is ill.*

Clause: *who normally works here.*



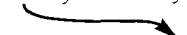
= **he** normally works here.

he is the subject, so this a subject relative clause.

The man who you saw yesterday is ill.

Main sentence: *The man is ill.*

Clause: *who you saw yesterday.*



= you saw **him** yesterday.

him is the object, so this is an object relative clause.

There's the man. His wallet was stolen.

→ *There's the man whose wallet was stolen.*

Note the difference between **whose** and **who's**: **who's** is never used to indicate possession, but is a contraction of **who is** or **who has**:

She's the one who's lending us the money. (who's lending = who is lending)

86 Defining and non-defining relative clauses: recognition

- There are two types of relative clause: defining and non-defining.
- Defining clauses are more common than non-defining clauses:
'I saw that man again.'
'Which man?'
'The man who wants to buy my house.'
who wants to buy my house is an example of a defining clause: it defines (= explains) exactly who or what is being discussed. It can also be used in a longer sentence:
The man who wants to buy my house is coming to see me.
I saw the man who wants to buy my house again.
- Non-defining clauses give information about the subject being discussed, but it is not essential information:
A man, who said he knew my father, asked me for money.
who said he knew my father is an interesting fact but it is extra rather than essential information. Non-defining clauses are indicated by the use of commas before and after the clause.

Notes

- Non-defining clauses are used in writing but are not used frequently in conversation, where two short sentences can be enough:
I'm going to see Sheila, who I told you about yesterday.
I'm going to see Sheila. I told you about her yesterday.
- The difference between defining (D) and non-defining (ND) clauses is important because:
 - a) they can change the meaning of a sentence:
 D: *I have two sisters who are living in New York at the moment.*
 ND: *I have two sisters, who are living in New York at the moment.*
 In the defining sentence, the person has two sisters in New York and may have more sisters somewhere else.
 In the non-defining sentence, the person has only two sisters.
 - b) Different relative pronouns (**who**, **that**, **which**, etc.) are used for defining and non-defining clauses (► Exercise 86).

PHRASAL VERBS

REMEMBER!

Phrasal verbs are formed with a verb + preposition or a verb + adverb:

We need to set off early tomorrow.

Did you find out the times of the trains?

I requested a pay rise but they turned me down.

- A phrasal verb is formed when a preposition (**up**, **down**, **in**, etc.) or an adverb (**away**, **back**, etc.) is added to a verb to produce a new verb with a different meaning:

*I **get up** at eight o'clock.*

*We'll **pick you up** outside the station.*

*The plane **took off** very quickly.*



- The meaning of a phrasal verb can be similar to the original verb:
*The car **slowed down** and then stopped.* (= similar meaning to **slow**)
– or it can be completely different from the original:
*I'm going to **give up** smoking.* (= different meaning from **give**)
- There are four main types of phrasal verb which are described in Exercises 91 to 94.

Notes

- Many verbs are followed by prepositions, but this does not mean that they are phrasal verbs. A phrasal verb has a meaning as a unit. The following are verbs + prepositions:

*What do you **think about** the idea?*

***Look at** these clothes!*

With verbs + prepositions, the direct object always follows the preposition, but the preposition does not have to come immediately after the verb:

*We **looked** carefully **at** all the clothes.*

*He **thought** for some minutes, and with much regret, **about** his parents.*

- Phrasal verbs can sometimes be type 1, or type 2, depending on their meaning:

*'Goodbye!' she said, and **hung up**. (= put the phone down). (type 1)*

*I **hung** my coat **up** behind the door. (type 2)*

- If the object (o) contains a large number of words, then the type 2 phrasal verb does not split:

*Have you **looked up** ^o the word were talking about this morning?*
